What a blessing to be able to hold week-long overnight camps again! We praise the Lord for sustaining this ministry through the shutdown and for allowing us to keep our permanent employees so we could open up in June with the rest of the state. In August, with only four days' notice, God brought a large guest group of 166 people. This income, coupled with the other guest groups in June and July, has allowed us to operate "in the black." It was a blessing to finally stop taking money out of our savings account in July, which we had been doing for over a year, to maintain our staff and facilities.

A few weeks ago, I took the senior Sunday school class from Cornerstone Church on a tour of the Ranch. Each time I stopped the tram, I would share of God's miraculous provision at that location. Someone asked if I had written a book. Unfortunately, I haven't had time to do that; however, I will take time in the following paragraphs to share a few of the ways we have seen God at work recently and how He has blessed this ministry.

Locating staff for summer camp is always a challenge. We had one college student from Iowa commit early on and then some junior camp counselors volunteered, but there were still a lot of positions needing to be filled. One former counselor was going to be out-of-state, but a week or so ahead of camp, his plans fell through and he felt God was leading him to be here. Another counselor was working at a golf course, but they closed the week of Senior High Camp for renovations so he was able to be here. One pastor and wife who I have asked to participate several times through the years have always declined because of her work schedule. This year I did not ask them, but her work schedule

cleared and they volunteered. I could go on and on. God put together a tremendous staff for our three weeks of camp. To Him be the glory!

What a blessing to have our Altec 55' aerial bucket truck



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up and running! Built into the back of the truck are a couple triangular shaped recesses for wheel chocks. (Wheel chocks are pieces of rubber or steel placed behind and/or in front of a wheel to keep the vehicle from accidentally rolling.) The recesses are a little lower profile on this truck bed than any of the wheel chocks we have here at the Ranch. Several weeks ago, we had a service crew on the property. One of the trucks was an Altec, so I asked to look at the wheel chock so I would know for what I was looking if I spotted one at a thrift store. I did some research that night and found I could buy one from Altec, but the cost for shipping was going to be almost as much as the wheel chock itself. I decided not to order them and would wait to see if I could find one elsewhere. In the morning, I went down to the barn to feed

the animals. In the wheelbarrow by the sheep pen was an Altec wheel chock. I assume a worker must have put it there, but I was thankful for the gift wherever it came from. I put it in our truck, and it fit perfectly.

After our summer camp program,

Inoticed the tumbleweeds in the field west of the camp needed some attention. I took the mower over there, but on the way I noticed the sage brush was really high around a couple pine trees. Although not really built to mow sage brush, our mower does an incredible job. However, unbeknownst to me, a piece apparently caught on the parking brake arm and pulled it free. Then the arm went around under the mower, doing damage until it broke off, and left the mower incapable of forward movement. I noticed the arm laying on the ground with one "ear" missing along with a special fitting. Bill wasn't sure how expensive the repair would be or if we could get the parts any time soon. He took off the damaged pieces and straightened them, then got his metal detector and searched the side of the hill until he found the missing piece. (Talk about a needle in a hay stack.) Bill welded the arm back together and reassembled the mower. We had a spare fan for the hydrostatic drive pump, so with the repair complete, the mower was operational a day later.

A few days ago, on my fourth or fifth trip to the maintenance shop, I spotted a minimally responsive man in his twenties on the side of the road. It was quite a shock to see someone on our remote property. I asked him where he came from, what his name was, how old he was, etc. but he didn't have any answers. I finally asked if he wanted medical help, and he replied "yes." The 911 dispatcher wanted to keep me on the line, so I couldn't let anyone else on staff know what was happening. Bill told me later that he just felt like he needed to go take a look around and happened to come past me while I was still talking with the 911 operator. Praise the Lord! Bill was able to go open the gates and escort the firetruck, ambulance, and ultimately the CHP to the young

SUMMER CAMP SUMMARY

Having addressed safety concerns and added sanitary measures last year, we were looking forward to offering overnight camping in 2021. However, with the fear and hype generated by the media over Covid-19 and broken promises from governmental entities over



reopening, we were beginning to have our doubts as to whether we would be able to open for our summer camping season. In 2020, we were only allowed to offer day camps, and we saw the number of campers plunge. Curiously, the greatest drop was in the number of junior campers, which are supposedly the age group least likely to be affected by Covid-19. As we began taking registrations for our 2021 camps, it was encouraging to see junior registrations two and a half times higher than in 2020. The amazing thing we noticed was that 38 of our 49 junior campers were at Victory Ranch for the very first time!



Another challenge was finding enough counselors and staff to efficiently operate. However, God filled each vacancy, and those He supplied made a better team than I could have imagined. Dr. Linn and Carol Carothers

and his infamous puppet, Deadwood Danny, spoke to our junior campers. The following week, Carl Kerby, an apologist with a ministry called Reasons for Hope, armed the high schoolers with the information they need to defend their faith. It was a blessing to have the youth worship team from Cornerstone Church in Hemet lead the music. Our final week of camp, we hosted our middle school campers.

Pastor Ben Ice, author of the Truth Trackers series, spoke to the middle schoolers.

Interestingly, as we looked back on our summer camp registrations, we discovered that almost half of our campers were first-time campers at Victory Ranch.
