One of the most stressful parts of this ministry happens during the months ahead of summer camp. We need to have adequate, qualified staff to provide our summer camp program. I'll have to admit that I'm a bit jealous of camp directors who have all their staff and counselors lined up in May. That has never happened in the all the years I've been at the Ranch. In fact, my own testimony as a college student attending Bethel Baptist Church in Torrance was to have my pastor call me on Sunday night to tell me that he had three boys that couldn't go to camp the following day unless he could find another counselor. Today that wouldn't happen due to the time needed for background checks, etc. That was 1982, and I was in the church van the following day, headed for Victory Ranch. There has not been a summer since then that I have not been here at Victory Ranch.

When I was asked to step into the role of director, I wanted to eliminate the stress of hunting for people at the last minute. I have tried to find our staff early. I contact prospective speakers in August, sometimes earlier, for the following summer. I contact pastors to serve as Camp Dads and Marshals. I ask who they would recommend as counselors from their church. I interact with prospective counselors at Sings and other events we sponsor, as well as visiting Bible colleges. However, I've found that it is getting more and more difficult for people to make a commitment. Some people have legitimate reasons for not being able to commit, and others just want to make sure nothing better is going to come up before they lock themselves into a commitment.



For summer 2022, I started contacting speakers in August of 2021. One by one they would tell me, "Let me think and pray about the opportunity." Weeks and months would often go by before I was told that "it just

won't work out for this summer." Back to square one, and the process would repeat. By April of 2022, I had a handful of counselors commit and some pastors, but I was still lacking speakers. Through one of the rejections, I got four names to try. Through those names, I ended up with yet another name. That name, Pastor Chris Hurton from Sunrise Bible Church in Red Bluff, shared his testimony and his passion for youth. I believed God had brought us the right man to speak to our middle schooler campers. As we concluded our conversation he told me, "If you had asked me in August,"

I would have told you no."

God had amazing things planned for this summer, and He wanted to make me rely on Him. When we ended up with only girls for Horsemanship Camp, I thought of Carol Carothers. Carol and her husband, Dr. Linn Carothers, committed to come. Carol came up with

an amazing set of lessons only to hear weeks later that she had cancer and would need surgery. She scheduled surgery immediately, so Lord willing, she would still be able to take part in the program. Following the surgery, Carol was told she would need to meet with doctors to discuss treatments. By God's grace, she was able to participate in Horsemanship Camp before meeting with the doctors. Please keep Dr. Carothers and Carol in your prayers.

Kristi Carter, our office manager, grew up attending Camp Tishomingo, a sister camp in Arizona. She mentioned a pastor who was always involved in camp there. Due to health concerns, he was not able to commit, but recommended another pastor, Tom Petro from Open Door Baptist Church in Prescott Valley, who also had been highly involved at Camp Tishomingo and was gifted in speaking to juniors. Pastor Tom was able to drive over and speak to our junior campers.

SUMMER CAMP UPDATE

We were blessed to have 22 young people try out for staff positions by attending our W(work) E(experience) S(staff) T(training) Week in June. The first week of July, we held our



Horsemanship Camp, which we limited to just 18 participants.

During the second week of July, we held our Junior Camp. Fifty-four of the eighty young people were first time campers at Victory Ranch. Pastor Tom Petro from Open Door Baptist Church of Prescott Valley, Arizona brought the messages. Pastor Russ Boone from Bible Baptist of Santa Monica brought the daily counselor devotions; and Pastor Steve Carter, retired ABWE church planter, brought the staff devotions. Shem Gott, raised at Tri City Church in Vista and Ranchview Baptist in Encinitas, led the worship.

Pastor Serhii Rybak, youth pastor and worship leader at Cornerstone Church in Hemet, spoke to our Senior High campers on July 18-23. The youth worship team from Cornerstone Church in Hemet led the worship. Pastor Adam and Grace Espinoza from Grace Baptist of El Centro served as Camp Dad and Mom with Pastor Espinoza taking the early afternoon session with the young people. Dave and Seth Gott served as Marshals for our Senior High campers.

The following week, Pastor Chris Hurton, Sunrise Bible Fellowship, Red Bluff, California was our speaker. Jordan Sibayan from Faith Calvary Baptist in L.A. led the worship. Pastor Carey and Becky Barnett from First Baptist of Beaumont served as Camp Dad and Mom, and Pastor Roger McCarty from First Baptist of Monte Serano (Los Gatos) served as Marshall.

Each week, our speakers addressed fear and the fact that our God is greater than any fears we may have as believers. During the course of the summer, we saw decisions made for God: from salvation, rededication, baptism, choosing the right friends, and choosing not to lie, to decisions to read the Bible more, to pray more, and to be a testimony for God at school. Please keep these young people in prayer as many are in public schools and many do not come from Christian homes. In fact, 36 of our campers this summer said they do not have a church. One hundred and two of our campers this summer were first-time campers at Victory Ranch. The majority of the campers this year were from Southern California; however, we had two campers from Red Bluff, CA, and eight from Los Gatos, CA. Other states represented were Arizona, Nebraska, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Virginia. Please pray that our campers who made decisions and those without church homes would find a good church to get "plugged into."

FALL LADIES' RETREAT
