Work Teams

Since our last newsletter, we were blessed to work alongside, and get to know, teams from Orchard Avenue Baptist Church in Vacaville and Westwood Baptist Church in Fresno. The teens and adults from these churches took on the dismantling of a 35 foot 5th wheel RV trailer that was of no future use to the Ranch. One team stripped off the aluminum, removed the wiring, copper pipe, etc., then took it apart piece by piece until there was nothing but the steel chassis left. The other team took apart the hay wagon and rebuilt it with treated wood, poured a concrete footing, sorted screws and bolts at the shop, and painted a couple cabins. We thank the Lord for these volunteers who used their talents for the Lord here at the Ranch.

New (Safer) Road

This spring the Riverside County Road Department contracted with Granite Construction to repair and resurface Gilman Springs Road. The road was closed midweeks from the end of May until mid-July at 8 p.m. and would open at



5 a.m. Ranch families and staff were given passes to get through the CHP roadblocks. New guardrails with steel posts were installed, and channelizers were glued down the center of the road separated by dual sets of yellow lines and rumble strips. In addition to repairing



the potholes and crumbling asphalt, the goal was to curb illegal passing and make the road safer for users. In the days ahead, all eastbound traffic on

the 60 Freeway will be routed down Gilman Springs Road at select times as the Skanska Corporation widens the 60 Freeway between Gilman Springs Road and Beaumont, a project that is expected to take a couple years to complete.

This was the year for inspections.

So. Cal. Edison regularly looks at trees on our property and sends out trimmers; however, this year they also inspected every pole, distances between poles, size wire, etc. Although Cal-Fire has inspected our facilities through the years for brush clearance, this was the first time we were inspected by the State Fire Marshal. Overall, they were pleased with our facility and operation. While we have lots of fire extinguishers, we have kept them out of reach from campers who might be tempted to empty them in non-emergency situations. Sean from Elite Fire Protection in Hemet donated fire extinguishers and boxes to install them in four locations around camp.

Our next inspection was from the Agricultural Commissioner's Office. They wanted to see records, MSDS sheets on herbicides and chemicals used in our operation, as well as where we store these items, protective equipment, location for decontamination, etc. Our county's Environmental Health Department did their annual inspection of the entire facility on July 9. We had a mixed reading on one of our commercial refrigerators, leading them to threaten to "impound" the refrigerator. I called Oscar at Mr. Appliance in Winchester, and he dispatched a technician immediately. The refrigerator was working properly before the inspection of the pool and grounds was completed, which made the inspectors happy since it kept them from having to return and re-inspect the refrigerator at a later date. I am trusting we are nearing the end of the inspections for this year.



November 2, 2019, the Ranch will once again host the annual meetings of the General Association of Regular Baptist Churches.



Mike Hess, the newly elected National Representative of the GARBC, will be our guest speaker. There will be programs during the general session for the children followed by a free lunch.

Early last year, Paul, the Executive Director at Victory Ranch, saw a flyer about a program at Provident Bank to benefit non-profit organizations. If the Ranch were to sign up, the camp



would receive a donation based on a percentage earned from its accounts and any other accounts that have elected to support us. On July 13, Provident Bank sent a representative over to present the Board Chairman Jay Lossing, with our first check in the amount of \$369.48.



"The Incredible He" was this year's summer camp theme. Evangelist Monte Leavell challenged the young people to really examine the



basis of their salvation. There were 99 campers

present for our Junior week of camp. It was a bit of a challenge lining up enough male counselors. For the girls, we had almost enough counselors to put two counselors in every room. Senior High week we were also challenged in looking for male counselors and, at the last minute, female counselors as well. However, God



provided as we hosted 79 campers. We finished up with our Middle school week with 61 campers. It has been encouraging having faces from the past come back to help us put on our program. this summer from as far away as China, Nebraska, New Mexico, North Carolina, Texas, and Washington. Our speaker was from Idaho, and one counselor flew in from Mississippi. Grace Anderson from First Baptist of Walteria, Torrance, who is fluent in Mandarin, served as a



counselor and helped explain the gospel to the Chinese students in their native tongue and led four of them to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. Each of these Chinese students were given a Bible in their native tongue. Total, we hosted 239 campers during our 3 weeks of camp. There were 19 salvation decisions, 1 for rededication, 2 for assurance of salvation, and 2 other decisions made for the Lord. Thank you for your financial and prayer support which
