

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From the Director's Desk: **By Paul Cayot**

Friday afternoon of July 14, during Junior Camp, a plume of smoke was noticed several miles to our west. Then the sheriff's department closed our road. A few hours later, a fleet of giant airplanes began a two-hour siege against the Rabbit Fire; however, at dark, they quit flying. I was contacted by CalFire to discuss the possibility of an evacuation but was then told we were fine. Following evening Chapel and a fireless campfire time in the dining room, the campers went off to bed. I took the tractor and began clearing some of the brush that was growing close to equipment in the back of the camp. Close to midnight, we were contacted again. The sheriff's deputies explained the fire was advancing a little faster than CalFire had anticipated and told us we needed to evacuate the camp.

The campers were told to pack their stuff and move to the Chapel lawn. Once each cabin was accounted for, they were sent to the dairy across the street and then to Grace Fellowship Bible Church in Hemet, where their parents picked them up. Volunteer staff moved their fifth-wheel trailers, and the Ranch's portable equipment was moved to the dairy. Once everyone and everything was evacuated, I spent the rest of the night on the tractor widening firebreaks. At daybreak, there were ten engine companies stationed around the camp. Due to an inversion layer, the smoke stayed close to the ground. Heading off to the spring that morning gave me an eerie feeling as I moved away from camp and toward the burning hills. I was able to bury the control box for the spring and create a better clearing around the rear water tank, always keeping an eye on an escape route should the fire begin moving faster.

extinguished. Most of the fire engines left. Around

noon, the fire from the north hit the creek bed by the spring and surged toward the camp, consuming the dry brush in its path. A lone helicopter would race back and forth across the street making water drops. I moved to the dairy, watching the thick dark smoke billowing toward the sky.

Praise the Lord, all Ranch property was spared! Firefighters returned to spend the next five nights watching the Ranch. One firefighter told me there was a one in a million chance of anything igniting at the Ranch at that point, but they stood by anyway. Unfortunately, CalFire did not lift the evacuation orders until noon on Tuesday the 18th, ruining any chance of us holding our Senior High week of camp.

Once the evacuation orders were lifted, we began the task of contacting parents and counselors to see if we could offer a combined Teen Camp the following week. Some counselors had used their vacation time the week before and were unable to attend, but most had understanding bosses. Our speaker, Frank Figuroa with Reasons for Hope, was here for both weeks, so we had a speaker. The worship teams from Senior High and Middle School weeks combined to lead our worship. Volunteers came to clean cabins and buildings that still had belongings inside from the rapid evacuation. More volunteers showed up to rake leaves and clean the grounds. After several days of work, the Ranch was ready for campers again. Our recreation staff staged the game equipment late in the week. On Monday, July 24, we kicked off our Teen Week of camp with 6 middle school cabins and 8 senior high cabins for a total of 108 campers.

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Whenever a camper makes a decision for Christ, we have that camper and their counselor fill out a decision card that is then mailed to his or her pastor. We send the camper some literature and a book from the Regular Baptist Press called *Basic Bible Truths*. Sometimes I wonder if anyone is actually reading the information we send them. Several weeks ago, we received a nice letter from a middle school camper thanking us for sending the information and telling us that she plans to read it each night before she goes to bed. Praise the Lord for this young lady and her desire to grow in the things of the Lord! Please keep each of our campers in prayer, that they would grow in the things of the Lord and that they would apply the biblical truths they heard at camp to their everyday lives.

Despite the summer not going as we had planned, God was watching over us and protected this property and the campers. All was not lost as we were able to offer a combined week of camp. God enabled many of the staff and counselors to rearrange their schedules. Decisions were made for Christ. There is so much for which to be thankful!

TRACTOR SAGA

On July 31, the tractor that I used all night on the firebreaks during the Rabbit Fire several weeks before "spontaneously combusted." Praise the Lord, it happened during the daylight, and my son, John Paul, saw the smoke. He raced up to the shop and emptied five fire extinguishers onto the tractor. The air cleaner canister was still smoldering when the fire department arrived. The wiring and hoses were compromised or melted, the radiator shroud and starter had components melt, the solder on the radiator melted, etc.

I priced used tractors, and similar ones were selling for \$9,000-\$15,000. Several days later, God brought to mind someone I had met over ten years ago. It turns out John worked for CASE for many years, and he currently has his own business (JBE Equipment Repair) repairing tractors and trucks. He agreed to come out and look at the tractor. After I had the starter rebuilt, he came out and worked on the tractor and got the engine to run. He ordered the parts we would need to replace, built our own wiring harness, and got the tractor operable and running again for less than \$5,000. Praise the Lord!

RECENT STAFF CHANGES

In addition to being a homeschool mom, Tiffany Farr had worked in the mortgage industry for many years. Tiffany's husband Tim grew up attending camp at Camp Victory/ Victory Ranch, and their son Jeremy has attended this camp for the past few years and worked on W.E.S.T. Week staff. Quite often, Tiffany and the family would come out and help Laraine in the kitchen. When Laraine stepped down as Food Services Director in May, Tiffany told me that the mortgage industry had dried up and she was interested in the Food Service Director position. Tiffany took over the position in June in a seamless transition, with our guests experiencing the same great food they have been accustomed to through the years. Praise the Lord for His provision to fill this position so quickly.



In the 1990s, Seth Gott worked for the Ranch as a wrangler and in maintenance and grounds. After marrying Holly, the two moved to Nebraska, where Seth has spent the past 20 years in law enforcement. Their children have occasionally attended camp through the years, and his son Silas even served as head wrangler this past summer.
